As previously mentioned, Friday is the Muslim Sabbath day and it is a religious obligation for us to receive the sermon and pray. Islamic traditions hold that in order to have a valid 'Sabbath' congregational sermon/prayer that there must be a minimum of no less than three (3) persons in attendance. Since this is not currently possible and unlike GITMO where detainees are able to conduct such services while still confined to 'chain link' cells, that allow for a free flow of conversation and fellowship - our situation here is expressly unique in comparison. Therefore, and by your leave; my solution to this legitimate concern would be to allow the detainee to listen to 'sermons' (khutbahs) on cassette tape. These tapes have been/will be recorded in both English and Arabic, which is the practice here in the U.S.; and are IAW with the legal obligations of the faith. As your Muslim Religious Liaison, I personally assure you that they do not contain any adverse material. Respectfully, I further recommend, if this request is approved; that the detainee be allowed to listen to these tapes (one per Friday)-- either using the player currently in A block or I could provide a walkman with headphones - one hour prior to the second scheduled prayer (approx. 1200 hrs) and then to conclude with his daily prayer (approx. 1300 hrs). Given the reservations clearly articulated by the powers that be, this recommended solution will allow for the free religious observance of the detainee by using expressly tailored modifications to those observances that simultaneously satisfy the 'security' restrictions that must be observed.







Afternoon Sir, as a follow-up the following procedures, movie listing and board games input is submitted for your review, consideration and approval. For info, I have made available one portable TV/VCR Combo for use in Alpha Block. The Combo has been placed on a wheeled cart, as the original mounting bracket for a TV in the Block had been removed some years ago, when the Block was closed. Considering the amount of time required to have PWC installed a new mounting bracket, decided the cart was a better option. The movies listed below are at No Expense to the facility, as they are the personal property of my staff and I. Once I had approval to provide movies, my staff and I decided to pool our assets for this purpose. The board games listed below are from the facilities inventory and therefore, there is No Expense incurred. Once I have your approval, I will issue a Transmittal change to the Alpha Block SOP covering the new incentives and procedures for implementation and management.

## Procedures for Movie Viewing:

(b)(6)

- Movie Call will be conducted Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday.
- Movie Call times will be between 1900-2200.
- Only those movies approved by higher authority are authorized to be shown.
- All movies will be maintained at the Watch Supervisors station and controlled by the Watch Supervisor.
- The detainee is permitted to view authorized movies from his cell, only. Under NO CIRCUMSTANCES is he permitted to view movies from outside his assigned cell.
- At movie call the Block assigned Guard Force member will retrieve the movie to be shown from the Watch Supervisor.
- The Block Guard Force member will position the TV/VCR Combo cart in front of the detainees cell to permit viewing and far enough away from the cell, such that the detainee does not have direct access to the controls.
- The Block Guard Force member will turn on TV/VCR, insert the movie to be shown, make any required adjustments, to include volume control. Volume will be set such that it is not greater than that volume produced by the installed General Announcing speaker located in the space.
- Upon completion of the movie the Block Guard Force member will rewind the movie shown, secure power to the TV/VCR Combo cart, reposition the cart to it's designated stowage area and return the movie to the Watch Supervisor for stowage.
- In the event of Code Blue/Man Down/Lock Down is called away during movie call the Block Guard Force member will secure the movie until such time the facility has secured from the condition.
- Any equipment difficulties encountered during movie that can be accomplished with onboard staff will be attempted. All equipment problems will be reported to the Brig CO during rounds the next work day.
- The assigned Block Guard Force member is permitted to view the movie with the detainee, if he so desires and so long as it does not interfere with his primary duties.



Importance:

Here is our response to your request. Please let me know if you need anything further.

- 1) Recommendation for 2-hours recreation time. If this is improved, how will this impact the Brig staff (impact on manpower, scheduling, and separation from regular prisoners)?
- \* Two hour recreation will not impact manpower (on routine days; may impact on days where there are visitors) or separation from regular prisoners. It will, however, impact ongoing contract work on the roof and elsewhere in the brig, to include the lighting project. To avoid impacting roof work, recommend we schedule two two-hour blocks of recreation before and after working hours. Our flexibility to schedule recreation hours will be enhanced when the lighting project is complete (approx Sept) thus allowing night-time recreation if desired.
- \* If directed, #1 and #3 can be rec'd outdoors at the same time--they would be separated by a concrete wall. A threat to security could arise if communication between the two occurs. This can be alleviated with staff directing the two ECs that should any form of communication occur, recreation call will be terminated.
- \* Currently the regular prisoner population is not allowed outside for recreation in black flag conditions. The policy for ECs could be modified to allow recreation during black flag, however, this raises concern for the staff members monitoring them. While guarding the ECs, staff are required to wear protective gear that is not conducive to spending long periods of time outdoors during black flag conditions. Although the Red Cross noted that the ECs are accustomed to hot weather, it should be noted that there are differences in the weather conditions in their native countries and here in SC (in terms of humidity, potential allergens, etc.).
- 2) Less light for #1. Please have a staff member talk to him about this so we can clarify whether he means less wattage or less hours. If it's less wattage, let us know if that's possible. If its less hours, let us know what the standard light-hours are for the detainees and for regular population.
- \* #1 clarified that the issue is wattage. To fix this, a light bulb cover can be affixed to the light in his cell in order to dim it. His real request is to see outside; for us to scrape the paint off his window so the cell is lit by natural light only. Both of these solutions negatively impact on the camera's view of cell from the Control Center. As he already uses reading glasses, recommend we issue him a set of eye glasses with light sensitive shading for use while in his cell.
- 3) Natural lighting for all. Review the reasonableness of allowing some natural light (what can be done, how expensive) & safety concerns & make a recommendation.
- \* To provide natural lighting would simply require scraping paint off the windows an easy, no-cost fix. #1 and #3 would have views of the SHU recreation yard (where they currently do outside rec). #2 is more problematic. To ensure he that has no view of the regular brig rec yard and no one can see him, would require that we relocate him to the same side currently occupied by #1 and #3. This raises very serious security concerns if #2 is given the ability to view external layouts of the facility and if able to see/hear the other ECs. For these reasons, recommend status quo for #2.

- 4) Arabic commentary for Koran. Please find out if his current Koran has commentary and, if so, whether it's in Arabic.
- \* Current Koran does not have commentary. #2 wants a TAFSIR Koran that has the commentary to the side. Two books that fit this request are Butter of TAFSIR or TAFSIR Ibn Katheer. He does not want both; one or the other will fit the requirement.

When you get a chance, please let me know if the books were delivered to #3.

\* Books were delivered to #3 last night.

Also, I was supposed to pick up a document that #1 signed for his attorneys -- I believe had him sign it. Do you know where it is?

\* Due to a miscommunication you did not receive the document but it is on its way to you via FedEx today.

Finally - (b)(6) asked whether the Brig should serve meals after evening prayer (rather than the regular meal times) when #2 decides to fast. Here's his answer: #2 should be told that, if he notifies the staff in the morning that he intends to fast for religious purposes, then we will delay MREs until after the evening prayer. He must notify us in the morning at the first morning staff visit. If he does not notify the staff in the morning, meals will be served at the regular time. Late meals will always be MREs - even if he returns to hot meals.

Ref the tasker received by JFCOM yesterday, the following USJFCOM steps have been taken to implement the FY05 NDAA (section 1092) provisions regarding actions to prevent the abuse of detainees held at the Charleston Naval Brig:

\*Provides all assigned personnel with training, and documented acknowledgement of receiving training, regarding the law of war, including the Geneva Conventions. During CY 2004 Deputy Fleet Judge Advocate, U.S. Fleet Forces Command (CFFC), provided on-site training for the staff members of the Naval Consolidated Brig Charleston (NAVCONBRIG) that interact with the detainees. The training included information and discussion on the Law of Armed Conflict, the Geneva Conventions, and other applicable domestic and international law.

"Establishes standard operating procedures for the treatment of detainees." NAVCONBRIG currently has such an SOP in place.

\*Providing all detainees with information, in their own language, of the applicable protections afforded under the Geneva Conventions.\* The sections of the Geneva Conventions relevant to the housing of Enemy Combatants (EC) were utilized to develop the NAVCONBRIG house rules.

These rules are posted in the NAVCONBRIG conspicuously so that the detainees could review them when transiting to and from outdoor recreation. Additionally, each EC was provided with a copy of the Brig rules to review and then sign. The language utilized is English; both ECs at the NAVCONBRIG speak and read English fluently.

"Conducting periodic unannounced and announced inspections of detention facilities in order to provide continued oversight of interrogation and detention operations." CFFC has periodically conducted announced inspections of the NAVCONBRIG.

"Ensuring that, to the maximum extent practicable, detainees and detention facility of a different gender are not alone together." The NAVCONBRIG only houses male detainees; furthermore, the NAVCONBRIG rules for the Special Handling Unit ensure that no staff member, of either sex, is ever alone with a detainee.

I also understand that there will be further guidance (in the form of a tasker) forthcoming from your office as it concerns the reporting requirements established in section 1093 of the 2005 NDAAA and that the first report required by that section will be due to the Joint Staff approximately 23 JUN 05 (covering the period from 15 JUN 04 to 15 JUN 05).







>Here's what I said last October and the same holds true today.

>The ECs are held in the Special Housing Unit, away from the general prison population, in order to ensure their physical safety. The UCMJ population detained at the Brig consists of individuals who have been adjudged guilty and sentenced for committing crimes - in the majority of cases, violent crimes. There are many among them who have displayed violent tendencies. At the same time, given their backgrounds in the United States Military, they tend to profess loyalty to their country and hostility toward persons whom they perceive to be enemies of the United States. They have access to outside media and are familiar with the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, ongoing conflicts in the Middle East and Afghanistan, and the fact that two ECs are being detained at the Brig. If the ECs are allowed to socialize with this general population, I would have grave concerns about the serious possibility that one or more of the UCMJ prisoners would try to inflict physical harm on them. Despite strenuous efforts to prevent violence and protect staff and prisoners, inmate-on-inmate violence is unfortunately a common problem at correctional facilities in general, and the risk of such violence is expanded when the situation involves a larger number of prisoners with United States military backgrounds commingled with a single or a small group of enemy combatant detainees. Without keeping the ECs physically separate from the general population, I would not be able to guarantee their safety. For this reason, among others, the UCMJ at Article 12 prohibits me from mixing U.S. military prisoners with enemy prisoners or other foreign nationals not members of the U.S. armed forces. Also, Navy regulations, specifically Secretary of the Navy Instruction 1640.9B, the Navy Corrections Manual, require that detainees be separated from adjudged, that is convicted, prisoners.

>The two ECs are likewise separated from each other. Just as allowing socialization of the ECs with the general UCMJ population, allowing them to socialize with each other raises concerns for their physical safety. If one detainee perceives (rightly or wrongly) that another detainee was/is cooperating with the United States and/or had abandoned or was disloyal to their original cause, the latter detainee might be placed in danger of attack. The same risk of physical danger pertains if one detainee perceives (rightly or wrongly) that another detainee is being treated differently somehow (e.g., that the detainee might be released imminently on certain conditions acceptable to the detainee and to the United States, or that one detainee has more privileges than another). Thus, for the safety of both ECs, it is imperative that they be kept separate from one another.

>In addition to the concern for their physical safety, there is a concern that were the ECs placed together they could share information in a way that would be harmful to national security interests. For instance, we have instituted extensive precautions and procedures so that the ECs will not accumulate knowledge and information (some of which is classified) about the Brig facility (the physical layout of the facility; the names and backgrounds of facility personnel; operational patterns at the facility; interrogation methods, etc.) that, in the wrong hands, could be used to the detriment of the United States. If the ECs were permitted to socialize and communicate with each other and "compare notes" about their respective experiences, these risks would be greatly magnified. Commingling the ECs could disrupt/prevent/compromise the gathering of information that could aid in our nation's war on terrorism.

Short answer: No we have not posted the Geneva Conventions.

Long answer: My reading is that Section 1092(b)(3) states that we have to have procedures ensuring that "each commander of a Department of Defense detention facility ... (3) Providing all detainees with information, in their own language, of the applicable protections afforded under the Geneva Conventions." The United States government has determined that the detainees at GTMO are unlawful enemy combatants and are therefore not entitled to protections under the Geneva Conventions. Although we treat detainees "consistent with" the Geneva Conventions, the Geneva Conventions do not apply to them.

Therefore, there are no "applicable protections under the Geneva Conventions" that the JDG Commander is required to post.

Ultimately, this is a policy decision. To the best of my knowledge, the detainee rights have never been posted at Guantanamo. The new draft DoD Directive 2310.1E, at paragraph E.3.1.6, states: "Combatant Commanders will ensure detainees are provided with information, in their own language, on the applicable protections afforded under the Geneva Conventions." While there are no "applicable protections under the Geneva Conventions" I can draft a comparison chart of detainee rights if you determine that we should post.

In fact, our JDG commander has asked to either be allowed to post a notice that the Geneva conventions do not apply or to be able to post those protections that do apply.
